Closer to the date we will circulate a Teams form for you to complete if you would like to attend.


School Uniform

Whilst the vast majority of student arrive at school in full school uniform there has been an increase in the number of students not following the school uniform expectations. Please can I remind parents that trainers and trainer style shoes are not permitted in school unless the student has a valid medical reason that has been agreed with Mr Baynes beforehand.



I would also like to remind parents of the rules regarding jewellery. A single ring and one pair of small, plain studs or sleeper size earrings and a watch are the only items allowed. All jewellery must be removed for PE activities and is brought into school entirely at the student's own risk. Students must not wear multiple rings, ear piercings, hoop style earrings or jewellery in the upper ear, ear cartilage, nose, tongue or gum. These items are banned and will be confiscated.

Any student not arriving in correct uniform will be lent uniform however this uniform must be returned at the end of the school day. Please could you have a look around at home and return any borrowed uniform.



Head of KS3 & KS4 Geography – Tim Pearce

The purpose of the Geography curriculum across KS3 and 4 is to provide a broad and varied representation of the different elements of Geography. We want students to be able to 'see themselves' within the curriculum and for the topics covered to be immediate and relevant to them. We intend the curriculum to be challenging for all students in both the knowledge that they will acquire as well as the skills they will develop. We also intend the sequencing of the curriculum to be layered and progressive where students will revisit and build upon prior knowledge and skills as they move through KS3 and KS4.

Geography is consistently a high performing department with strong levels of uptake and success at GCSE level and this reflects the care, passion and enthusiasm of the departmental staff. As we gradually head towards the summer term, we will be taking our Y10 GCSE students to Southwold for their coastal fieldwork exercises. Also, we have a confirmed 58 students from Y9 and Y10 going to Iceland in October.

Geography is everywhere and everything, so working with students in this subject is a real pleasure!

Last Half Terms Highlights:

In Geography Year 7 have just completed a module of work on rivers and flooding which has seen them look at the theory behind river processes and landforms as well as the causes and consequences of flooding. This has afforded the classes the opportunity to bring things very much up to date with looking at how the recent floods in the UK have had devastating impacts on the lives of some UK residents.

In English, Year 7 have been studying non-fiction texts including Anne Frank's diary and newspaper articles about the evacuation of children in England during World War Two. They have been focusing on identifying and analysing different viewpoints and perspectives whilst reflecting on social injustice and prejudice.

Extra-Curricular Activity Highlights: Sport leadership

Five Year 7 students led a primary school sports festival for over 160 Primary students. The Year 7 students were in charge of two of the eight stations (kin-ball and rowing) and they received glowing feedback from the primary students and teachers.

Year 7 Wellcome Genome Campus Visit

Students learned about DNA sequencing, taking part in a series of activities including genetic sequencing, microscope work and using pipettes.
