Principal's Message

Dear Parents and Carers,

My first full week at Coleridge Community College has been a delight and I can happily say that I have been made to feel very much a part of the school already. The week started with a meeting with staff to outline some exciting plans to change the focus of the school day. The start and end times remain the same, but the day has been restructured to include an extended period with tutors in the morning. The positive relationships built within this time are so important and make for a great start to the day. During Form Time students will continue to take part in a full Literacy/Reading programme. We will continue to deliver a broad range of Personal, Social, Health and Economic education (PSHE) as well as looking at Careers and Citizenship. Assemblies with the respective Heads of Year will also take place during this time. This change also enables the school to go to a longer, single lunchtime which will allow staff to run a broad range of enrichment clubs with which your children can engage. We will communicate the full list of available clubs in next week's newsletter.

As I wrote last week, it is so impressive to see the young people at Coleridge demonstrating the values that we all hold dear. I felt very privileged to listen to the Year 8 students delivering presentations about charities to a packed auditorium on Thursday. The students have spent the past few weeks identifying, researching and supporting deserving charities alongside an organisation called FirstGive. On Thursday, four groups delivered presentation on the following charities: Cambridge Cyrenians, Centre 33, The Samaritans and The Edmund Trust. It was great to see our young people working together to raise awareness about these deserving charities and demonstrating such a strong social conscience. I will leave the details to Ms Biamonti next week, but it is clear from the students that this is only the beginning. Many of the children voiced that they hope to find ways to volunteer their time to support further and we thoroughly encourage this sense of social responsibility. Proof that we can all learn from our youngsters and that we should feel rightfully proud of them.

On a final note, I would like to raise a concern about the front of school. The area does get congested at the start and the end of the day. Whilst welcoming students into school, or saying goodbye to them at the end of the day, I have seen a number of near misses this week with cars, cyclists and pedestrians. Your child's safety is our primary concern and so could I please ask you to not drop off or pick up your children from directly outside the school. I really do appreciate your assistance with this matter.

Curriculum Spotlight

RS Curriculum Spotlight

Religious Studies at Coleridge has been undergoing an exciting curriculum revamp, this has been ongoing throughout the school year and the response from students has been really positive! They have engaged in philosophical and moral discussions, and learnt a variety of religious views and their origins, as well as non-religious views and Humanism.

An overview of topics students have been studying at Key Stage 3 -

Year 7

In Year 7 students cover three topics - Origins of the Abrahamic Faiths, Christianity and Judaism. All of which are studied in greater depth during their time at Coleridge and give them a great foundation of knowledge should students want to continue RS at GCSE. In Unit 1 "Origins of the Abrahamic Faith", students have had lessons on various topics including; views on Creation, Adam and Eve, Noah and the Flood, Moses and the Exodus. In Unit 2 "Christianity" students have studied religious scripture, parables, and events including the Nativity and the significance of Jesus' crucifixion and ascension. Into the summer term students will study Unit 3 "Judaism", where they will learn about the Torah, Pesach and Yom Kippur, anti-Semitism and the Holocaust.

Year 8

Year 8 have studied three key topics — Islam, Atheism, and will be moving on to Philosophy of Religion where they will be considering theologians views on various aspects of God, the afterlife and other themes and concepts involved in religious traditions. We are currently looking to introduce a new topic on Hinduism which will further enrich their understanding of the multi-faith society we live in.

Year 9

In Year 9, after studying Animal Rights and the Holocaust, students have recently started a new topic on

Life and Death. This can raise some sensitive issues and it has been amazing to see students maturity and respect for the topic. This unit requires students to consider the views of moral philosophers and their theories linked to consequences of the decision we make (such as Philippa Foot's 1967 Trolley problem theory — if you're not sure what this is ask a Year 9 to explain!) they will then go on to study Natural Law theory, Sanctity and Quality of life as well as other moral and philosophical topics.




