What Parents & Carers Need to Know about PHONE SCAMS

In a three-month period during 2021, no fewer than 46 million people in the UK experienced a suspicious attempt at being contacted via their mobile. Phone scams are a common form of cyber-attack where fraudsters engage directly with their intended victim through their smartphone, as our phones carry so many sensitive (and therefore potentially valuable) details about us, it's vital that trusted adults are alert to the tactics that scammers use to get access to user accounts, personal data and private information for financial gain.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

SMISHING
SMS phishing, or 'smishing' is one of the most common forms of mobile-based cyber-attacks. Smishing is when a scammer texts their target, pretending to be a reputable person or organisation. They aim to trick the victim into providing sensitive data such as bank details and personal information, so that they can then access and empty the bank accounts and remove money.

IMPERSONATION
Fraudsters often impersonate someone else to trick the victim into actually transferring money to what is their mobile. For example, they might call, for example, a friend or relative using a different number, who urgently needs funds. Other common lures include sending false texts informing the target that they have a package which requires a fee to be delivered, or that they have an unpaid bill to settle.

NUMBER SPOOFING
Here, the scammer takes impersonation one step further by cloning the phone number of a genuine company. So when the target receives a call or text, their phone recognises the sender's number as being the real one (e.g. Amazon, eBay, etc.). The trick is that the scammer will have the caller ID spoofed so that they appear to be calling from the legitimate company, but the victim will be talking to a scammer.

DO SOME DIGGING
If you've received a call or text asking for money, insurance, or other sensitive information, resist the urge to give your phone number and will then display any relevant information about - this usually includes feedback and comments from other people, so you can easily see if that particular number has been implicated in potential scams.

BREAK OUT THE TECH
Lots of anti-virus software now also protects mobiles. Some anti-virus apps can detect phishing links in text messages and alert you to the risk, which is a good idea, and you can also use a mobile security app to protect your phone. It's far less secure than your home Wi-Fi network, but you should consider installing a VPN (Virtual Private Network), which encrypts all data travelling to and from your phone.

REPORT INCIDENTS
If you or a family member does give out confidential information to a caller you aren't sure about, contact the action company mentioned to check if the call was genuine. If you confirm that the call was not made by their organisation, you should report it as a potential scam to the Action Fraud Centre and, depending on exactly what information was divulged, consider involving the police.

BE WARY OF LINKS
If you get a message from an unknown number asking you to click on a link, report it as spam and do not open the link. One recent example 'wanted' victims they'd been alerted to the Central Bank and needed to click a link to buy a special test - only to find they had paid their money to scammers. Links can also install malware onto your phone or allow them to access location.

VERIFY THE SOURCE
Never give personal details to an unfamiliar web site, unless you're certain you're unfamiliar with the site. If you're unsure, contact the company you trust but is still asking for personal details, and the conversation. Then find the company's genuine number on a bill or on their website and call them directly to confirm if there really is an issue you need to address.

SM HJACKING
SIM hijacking switches control of a phone account from the victim's SIM card to one in the scammer's possession. Criminals use personal details placed together from social media (Facebook, LinkedIn, etc.) to impersonate you and get access to your phone number. They then use this to transfer your number to their SIM, giving them access to all calls and texts meant for you, including one-time login passwords.

FAKE TECH SUPPORT
Attackers contact a target, impersonating their employer's IT support team. They then use their access to download some software to fix a technical issue with their device. In reality, however, the software grants the scammers access to the victim's private data and sensitive information. This can be more common on mobile and landline devices, but it's still possible to accomplish on mobile.

Curriculum Spotlight

Year 11 have completed their final devised performances and sat their mock exams. They are now working on their scripted performances. Performing monologues and duologues by John Godber.

Key Stage 3 Drama Club

Key Stage 3 Drama club (years 7-9) is on every Wednesday 3:20 – 4:20pm in the Drama Studio. Students have brilliant fun creating improvisations and developing their skills and love of Drama.

Shakespeare Speaking Union – Performing Shakespeare

The whole of Year 8 performed monologues and duologues in lessons from three Shakespeare plays A Midsummer's Night's Dream, Macbeth and Romeo and Juliet. Ten students were then selected to go through to the school round where they performed in front of our esteemed judging panel of Mrs Stoneham and Mrs Cozens. Congratulations to Raff Torres Lyons who won with a mesmerising performance of Romeo's death scene. He will now represent Cole-ridge at the regional round competing against other schools for a place in the national final to be held at Stratford-upon-Avon.


Frantic Assembly
